<p style="text-align: center;">Top/Left Side: RAP: Review And Preview</p> <p>This section will be used to review concepts from previous lessons or to get students thinking about new concepts from the new lesson.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Right Side: WOW: Words of Wisdom</p> <p>This section is used in class to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • take class notes • draw and label diagrams • draw maps • list vocabulary • use graphic organizer • paste teacher handouts • answer questions from text readings
<p style="text-align: center;">Bottom/Left Side: WIO: Work It Out</p> <p>This section will be used for student responses to information learned in class. This part will sometimes be done at end of class as a summarizer, and will sometimes be homework. The type of response will vary and will be decided by the teacher.</p>	

Materials:

Assessment:

Notebook will be collected and graded on the day of classroom tests. Assessment will consider detail and accuracy of information, organization of work, visual appeal, and whether or not assigned sections of the notebook are finished on time. A rubric will be provided for specifics regarding assessment.

4	Accurate, complete, lots of detail, neat, color always included if suggested, and effort is exceptional.
3	Accurate, complete, some detail, neat, color usually included if suggested, and effort is good.
2	Mostly accurate, mostly complete, basic, strives for neatness, color sometimes included if suggested, and effort is shown.
1	Frequent errors in content, some entries missing, lack detail, messy, color rarely included if suggested, effort is lacking.
